Spring Open Gardens

20-21 October 2018

A Relaxed Garden

17 Gilmore Crescent Garran, ACT

A productive cottage garden without a lawn. Featuring moving water, fruit trees, a wisteria-covered arbour, camellias and bulbs. The owner's efforts to establish a sound basic structure of visual rooms and access paths, and to improve the soil, have paid off. Now they have garden that does not need constant attention, allowing them to simply relax and enjoy the constantly changing colours of flowers and foliage.



El's Garden

3 Ramage Place Flynn, ACT

A quarter acre, gently south-sloping block, The garden includes a variety of ornamental zones front and back including a substantial variety of native plants. In the back garden a small pond and creek make a lovely setting. A wisteria covered pergola creates a shady outdoor area for a cup of tea or coffee.



3-4 November 2018

Finch Farmlet

68 Hambidge Crescent Chisholm, ACT

One of 15 demonstration gardens chosen under the ACT Government's H2OK Healthy Waterways Program Stage 1. Water capture is integrated into the sloping, terraced gardens which also feature many ornamental and vegetable garden beds, herbs, fruit trees, a poultry enclosure, an orchid shade-house, a winter glasshouse, pleasant sitting areas and themed art works. Short talks on the water sensitive gardening will be held at 11.30am and 1.30 pm each day.



Mayfield

26 Gratwick Street Gowrie, ACT

Established during Canberra's most recent drought (2003-2008), this garden was transformed from an uninteresting and mostly bare yard, to a plant-filled colourful surprise. Sited on a gentle slope the garden is on several levels, filled with a mix of natives and exotics



in the front and roses under-planted with cottage plants in the back. Flowering shrubs, shady sections and a touch of formality add extra interest.

10-11 November 2018

Cuppacumbalong

21 Naas Road Tharwa, NSW

Both the heritage listed
Cuppacumbalong House and the
surrounding gardens will be opened to
the public. The new owners are
renovating the terraced gardens, in
keeping with early 20th Century styles.
The grounds, suitable for picnics, are
framed by large shade trees and face
onto the Murrumbidgee River, where a
mown path lead to a small historic
cemetery. Refreshments are available,



visitors are encouraged to bring mugs so as to reduce waste.

The owners now provide accommodation, an events venue and teaching in crafts. The open gardens weekend will feature black-smithing demonstrations on both days and one day knife-making courses. 24-25 November 2018

Serendipitous Garden

12 Lawrence Circ Kambah, ACT

This prolific and mature native garden has tall trees at the front and a panoramic view of the Brindabellas. The back is a contrast, where woodland is interspersed with vegetable plots, a large berry patch, fruit trees, a chook shed and bee colonies.

Listen to the owners reminisce about the garden's evolution and inform visitors about keeping chooks and bees, growing berries and vegetables, managing possums and managing a sustainable water supply.

Roserie de la Faunt

2 Larakia Street Waramanga, ACT
Full of the grace and charm of a cottage garden,
Roserie de la Faunt includes over 500 bush and
climbing roses. This large suburban garden
features mature trees, along with a pond and





fountain. The understorey includes a variety of flowering bulbs, hellebores, azalea and camellias. Fruit trees, raised vegetable beds and chooks ensure the garden is productive as well as beautiful.

Dragon flies and blue bees: Open Garden 24 & 25 February 2018

Visiting open gardens is a delightful way to spend an afternoon. You get to meet people who love gardens and gardening and look into their creative gardening visions.

Julie and I had the pleasure this year of hosting our own garden on 24 and 25 February, 2018. Advertised as 'Dragon flies and blue bees' the garden represents our vision of a permaculture philosophy and what can be achieved on a small 600 square metre plot. The garden is eight years old and on display were summer vegetables, 100 fruit and nut trees, free range chickens and a natural swimming pool. The garden is landscaped with rock paths and varieties of native plants to attract beneficial insects and wild life.

Saturday opened with over 800 visitors it was very busy. The Canberra Times and also local radio covered the event. People were very interested in the espalier fruit trees, hazelnut truffle trees, the Maran chickens and how the natural pool worked. Julie and I spent the whole day talking about our garden with visitors. Our most frequently asked question was about the swamp hibiscus which was in full bloom in the natural pool.

Sunday started with very high rain fall. The front garden was under 10 cm of water in the morning but it dissipated by mid-day when the rain cleared. Gardeners seem not to be deterred by a bit of rain and the day also received many visitors.

Julie and I consider the experience of hosting the open garden as a major highlight of this year; we loved engaging with the visitors and talking about gardening.





We really did appreciate all the work of the volunteers on the day as well as those behind the scenes and thank them for giving us the opportunity.

A total of 20 garden owners and volunteers joined several of the Committee in the Crosbie Morrison building. We all enjoyed catching up with and meeting other gardeners over tea, coffee, scones and friands.

Paulene Cairnduff, known to many from 2CC's 'Garden Gurus' program, then gave us a presentation on the Fetherston Gardens in Weston. These public gardens are a 3.4ha section of what was once the School of Horticulture Weston Campus. When gazetted for public use in 2010, the gardens were named in honour of Tony Fetherston, the School's first and longest-serving Head of Horticulture.

Paulene studied horticulture there and 'did not dream that I would still be in the garden all these years later'. The site is now an ACT Urban Park. Volunteers from the 'Friends of Fetherston Gardens' are responsible for restoring and maintaining the gardens, in collaboration with Parks staff. Everyone is welcome to attend their regular working bees!

The Fetherston Gardens represent an important part of Canberra's horticultural history and are well worth a visit.

There will be an open day in the gardens on 28 October (11am – 3pm) to celebrate Weston Creeks 50th birthday.

Thank you to the many members, ex members and newsletter subscribers who completed our on-line survey. Of the 994 people we invited to participate we had a very pleasing 31% response rate. Overall the feedback was very positive with over 80% of respondents either satisfied or very satisfied with the number of gardens opened, the range of garden styles and the quality of gardens opened.
