Spring 2024 Open Gardens



A haven featuring spring flowering shrubs, annuals and flowering trees including a stunning weeping cherry. A cobblestoned space framed by a wisteria covered pergola, views to Mt Taylor and a large productive vegetable garden complete the picture. Read more...

Cuumbeun

24 Severe St, Greenleigh, Queanbeyan NSW




Over forty years the owners have created a spectacular natural landscaped native garden around the house and maintained the remainder of the two-hectare block as an open dry native eucalypt forest. The plantings are predominantly local species, and many are threatened. A nursery of propagated plants and a worm farm are of special interest. Cleared meandering paths enable access to the garden and the bushland. Propagation demonstrations at 11am and 2pm. Read More...

13 Geerilong Gardens, Reid, ACT




At My Therapy in Reid, visitors will enjoy the enclosed Japanese style formal garden at the front of the 1930s house. Circling the house, they will discover a very large wisteria covering an entertainment area and large water features. In the contrasting back garden, features include large grassed are, a huge Chinese elm, Ulmus parvifolia, and a large Olive tree. Read More...

Narrawong





Narrawong is a mix of formal and cottage garden styles, designed to make the most of a small area. There is a variety of flowering and aromatic perennials and cottage plants including azaleas and rhododendrons, which provide a splash of colour in Spring against the backdrop of mature trees. The plantings chosen in BeaverLea, come from an eclectic taste in flowers and trees which the owner could not resist and indulged herself on whimsical impulse. The front is her "Arboreal Cathedral" which, more or less, came with the house. Read More...

Hillside
49 Sullivan Cres, Wanniassa, ACT



Mid-October at Hillside in Wanniassa sees the peak of flowering in most parts of the garden, especially Camellias, Eremophilas, Alyogynes, true geraniums, Correas, Cliveas, Iris and Grevilleas. Many rare shrubs and perennials are also peaking then, most deciduous plants are in fresh leaf and a wide variety of bulbs and annuals are in full display. With expansive views of the Tuggeranong Valley and ranges beyond, the sloping site lends itself to terracing and, meandering pathways, stairs, stone retaining walls and a bubbling pond. Read more...

Fairview

71 Euree St, Reid, ACT



Fairview is a professionally landscaped garden planned by its qualified horticulturalist and landscape architect owner to complement and highlight the 1927 heritage cottage. There are water features and a varied and intriguing range of garden rooms with layers and textures created by the plants, many featuring art installations and sculptures, including Japanese elements. The heritage cottage will also be opened to garden visitors, allowing views to each of the outside garden rooms. Read more...

Teacher's Rest

5 Macedon Cres, Palmerston, ACT



Teacher's Rest in Palmerston, is a cottage style garden, surrounding the house on level ground. It is a showpiece of many roses – at their best this month, mixed with a variety of perennials, shrubs and small trees, mostly planted within the last five years. Vegetables, fruit trees and pieces of art are placed among the back garden beds. Further interest is added with pleasant rest areas and vantage points. Read More...

Dhulwa

5 Boyce Pl, Chifley, ACT



At Dhulwa in Chifley, visitors' first experience is a front garden of mature banksias, wattles and other native shrubs, which nicely merge with the neighbouring garden and attract native birds including gang gang and yellow tailed cockatoos and nesting wattle birds. The stonework lined paths take the visitor on a journey around the house through a series of quiet sanctuaries including a meditation garden, immersed in the shade of large Melia, Pear and ash trees. Volunteers profile Lynlea & Clive Rodger



Clive and I have always enjoyed gardens and gardening. Growing up in Sydney the Blue Mountains and its open gardens was one of our favourite destinations. We have established gardens and/or renovated gardens in each home where we have lived.

We arrived into Canberra in the mid 1970's experiencing a very different climate and soils. In Canberra we have gardened in one garden with natives, in another a large heritage garden with rhododendrons and roses (opened twice to Open Gardens Australia).

Our present garden is an average sized suburban block with a fully renovated garden now three years old. It was opened with Canberra Open Gardens in 2023 to show what can be done in 2 years.

Over our gardening span we have learned Clive enjoys exotics and textures, Lynlea enjoys colour through the year: Clive values lawns and planting, including varieties of bulbs and annuals, Lynlea has learned soil improvement, composting and the delights of vegetable growing and mulching.

Over the years we have had the opportunity to travel on garden tours, learn something of the history of gardening in Europe and visit world class gardens. A memory which sticks is the pride of such gardeners in the potting shed and the empty pots of the things that didn't work. A key principle for us is that there is no formula for gardening, no mistakes, no failures. Gardening is a pleasurable experience and a lifetime of learning.

Each garden unique.

Over the years too we have learned what works in Canberra, how to plant for the climate and the garden environment. What brings us pleasure is places to sit and enjoy a shared cup of tea, and barbeque and hospitality spaces for family and friends.

We have appreciated and valued sharing the skills of other gardeners in Canberra, including through Open Gardens. Volunteering at a garden, visiting gardens hosts are generous to open and share is a weekend pleasure and inspiration.

Project news





Croke Place Wetlands

This project in Evatt and near Lake Ginninderra was co-funded by Open Gardens Canberra in 2023 and after some tribulations is now complete. Croke Place Wetlands Land Care Group was allocated \$1,500 towards the construction of three seats to provide rest and pleasant viewing for visitors at different sites overlooking the wetlands and Ginninderra Creek.

Other contributions came from the Lions Club of Canberra City (hardwood from a sawmill at Termeil, north of Batemans Bay); woodworkers from the Triton Owners Club who made the seats to a design copied from a seat in a park in Albury; Bunnings for preservative material and hardware; the ACT Government for approval to install; and – importantly - Croke Place land carers digging for the foundation slabs.

The Croke Place Wetlands Land Care site now boasts three very sturdy seats in prime locations. One seat faces west with a view over the wetlands while the other two seats have been placed in a 'V' formation atop a small rise overlooking Ginninderra Creek, and towards a small island that is formed as the creek goes one way and a flooded anabranch another.

Croke Place Wetlands is a lovely place to visit for a wander or a picnic (or a sit!); please drop by and marvel at what has already been achieved by this energetic Land Care group. Congratulations on an inspiring community effort!
